1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Being affiliated with Kurukshetra University Kurukshetra, Indira Gandhi National College follows the course curriculum designed by Kurukshetra University Kurukshetra for various streams. The college follows the academic calendar in accordance with Kurukshetra University. The institution has developed a structured and effective implementation of the curriculum. Based on the University calendar, the college plans its various activities of different departments and cells, which are followed by each department and cell respectively. Principal holds a meeting at the beginning of the academic year to finalize the plan of action for transacting the curriculum with the help of lesson plan and formulating guidelines for various activities. The departments chalk out Course Outcomes (COs), Program Outcomes (POs) and Program Specific Outcomes (PSOs). Lesson plan is prepared by respective faculty members at the beginning of each semester and uploaded on the website of the college. It gives an insight to the students and teachers how the lecture class will be handled throughout the semester. A proper time table is made and displayed on the notice boards keeping in view the availability of faculty and students and implemented properly. An orientation programme is conducted during the first week of the session. The objective is to acclimatise the freshmen with the new surroundings and develop a sense of bonding with their fellow students and teachers. It helps them understand their responsibility towards various social issues and imbibe humanitarian values to become responsible citizens. The orientation programme is conducive to develop a fruitful teaching-learning experience. The teachers identify the slow learners and fast learners through direct and indirect assessment and chalk out a plan to work on their weaknesses and strengthen their innate potential. Time to time meeting is held by HOD's of various departments with their colleagues to discuss the progress and further plan of action for their respective departments. The Career Guidance Cell of the college provides career counselling and orientation to the students for different job prospects. The mentors assigned to the students interact with them and help them to understand and resolve their academic and other difficulties. Teachers use interactive boards, projectors as technical aids to impart knowledge to the students. The college believes in providing its students access to various sources of knowledge for effective learning and therefore, not confining it within the peripheral boundaries of the class room.

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained



Focusing on the overall development of the institution and assessing the relevance and appropriateness of the curricula to cater to the requirements of the society, economy and environment, I.G.N. College has developed the practice of collecting feedback from different stake holders including students, teachers, employers, alumni and parents. The objective is to enhance the performance of the institution by taking into consideration the responses of various stakeholders on the curriculum, teaching schedules, teaching tools, students' assessment and learning outcomes for taking constructive measures for further improvements. An online feedback from a random selection of 380 students from various streams of the college was taken to assess their responses on the various issues like—curriculum transaction and assessment teachers' behaviour and communicative skills and learning exposures provided to students through field visits and educational tours. The analysis and interpretation of the feedback received from the students resulted in the following outcome: Most of the students (80 to 91 percent) agree that teachers discuss the topics in detail and cover the entire syllabus teachers communicate clearly and effectively while transacting the curriculum teachers encourage the students for participation and discussion in the class teachers have amiable and cooperative attitude towards the students teachers take their class tests and assignments regularly teachers pay special attention to academically weak students and the books and reading material are available in the library as per requirement of the curriculum. Few students (6 to 10 percent) do not agree with the statements whereas some students (3 to 10 percent) are not sure. The feedback regarding the learning exposure of the students shows that 68 percent of the students agree that teachers take active interest in arranging field visit, educational tours for the enhancement of learning. 20 percent of the students do not agree with the statement whereas 12 percent of the students are not sure. An online feedback from the teaching faculty (25 teachers) of the college was taken to assess their views on the various issues. Most of the teachers (73 to 92 percent) agree on the following facts: quality measures adopted by the college administration to promote the growth of teaching faculty the teaching staff exhibits a cooperative and harmonious unity while executing academic tasks adequate infrastructure for the application of various IT Tools and advanced library facilities. Few teachers (4 to 18 percent) show their disagreement with the statements and some of the teachers (4 to 15 percent) show a neutral response. An online feedback of the Alumni of the college was taken from a random selection of 101 alumni. 88 percent of the alumni show their agreement on the following issues: the relevance of curriculum, upkeep of infrastructure, laboratory facilities and workmanship of teaching and non-teaching staff whereas 12 percent of them show their disagreement. An online feedback of the parents of the college students was taken from a random selection of 113 parents inviting their valuable responses on the issues like—administrative, academic and infrastructural facilities given to their wards by the institute.

The Institution has students mentoring system in order to assist them in comprehending and resolving their academic and other difficulties, apprise the students about College activities and to guide them for participation in various activities. For the accomplishment of this objective the College organises assembly for freshmen and constitute Mentor groups to develop homely relationship between students and teachers. The College organised Fresher's Assembly and Orientation Programme on August 02, 2018. The In charges of various activities like NCC, NSS, Cultural, Sports, Library, Women Cell, Career Guidance Cell, Legal Literacy Cell, Anti Ragging Cell, Editorial Board, Red Cross etc. apprised the students about the norms, eligibility conditions and the benefits of these activities in their career building. The students were acquainted with the benefit of weightage in marks on the basis of activities like NSS, NCC, and Sports etc. for higher studies. The College Librarian informed the students about the methods of using library facilities like the process of issuing books from college library. The Chief Editor of College Magazine highlighted the value of creative writing to the students. She informed the students that in order to inculcate the habit of regular writing among the students the college publishes a College Magazine Haryana Rashmi. The magazine includes constructive and creative pieces of writing by talented students. The editor also emphasized the value of original and authentic writing and acquainted the students about the dangers involved in plagiarism. The teaching staff acquainted the students with the role of various activities in their personality development. They motivated the students to join and actively participate in these activities. The Mentor Mentee groups were created on 11-09-2018 for the session 2018-19 in order to build a healthy relationship and rapport between students and teachers. The college organized meetings of Mentor Mentees on September 29, 2018 and October 01, 2018 to guide and counsel the students. The Mentees were directed to meet and interact with their mentors before examinations on October 08, 2018 to receive the requisite guidance regarding their difficulties and problems. The subsequent meetings for this purpose were held on November, 02 and 03, 2018 and February, 11 and 12, 2019.

##### 2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

**Response:** The University adopted the Semester System of teaching in 2011 as recommended by the UGC. Teachers interact with students in their initial lectures and assess them for grouping into Advanced Learners and Slow Learners. On the basis of this assessment the teachers provide them the required academic tasks like Class Tests, Assignments, Presentations and Group Discussion etc. The college takes Internal Assessment of 20 marks. It ensures complete transparency in this entire internal evaluation. For this objective the Examination Committee of college assigns a schedule of class tests and submission of Assignments within a particular time frame. In accordance with the guidelines of the Examination Committee the teaching staffs takes the assignments from the students and conduct the assessment tests. After proper evaluation, the assignments are thoroughly discussed with the students and teachers motivate the students to correct their mistakes and improve their performance.

##### 2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The university published the Academic Calendar containing the schedule of admission and duration of terms and vacations, admission procedure and regulations other eligibility conditions, examinations, list of holidays, and other information prior to the beginning of the academic session. The academic

calendar of the institution, given in the college prospectus, mentioned the period of term-end / semester examinations. The college strictly adheres to the time schedule laid down by the academic calendar. For each course, the respective teachers follow the pattern guidelines issued by Kurukshetra University, Kurukshetra. The college assigns two home assignments and one class test to the students in each semester. The criteria for the preparation of internal assessment are given below: Two handwritten Assignment : 50 percent One Class Test : 25 percent Attendance : 25 percent Marks for Attendance are given as under: (i) 91 percent onwards : 5 Marks (ii) 81 to 90 percent : 4 Marks (iii) 75 to 80 percent : 3 Marks (iv) 70 to 74 percent : 2 Marks and (v) 65 to 69 percent : 1 Mark For students engaged in co-curricular activities of the college / authenticated medical ground duly approved by the college Principal. The University allows the re-evaluation of answer books and candidates can also get and inspect the photocopies of their answer books. The College encourages teachers and students to have an interactive and open teaching-learning environment wherein the students' grievances with reference to evaluation are redressed internally and amicably. The college ensures transparency and resolves discrepancies in all the activities conducted at different levels.

The college ensures optimal allocation and utilization of the available financial resources for maintenance and upkeep of different facilities. Meetings of various committees constituted for this purpose, are held regularly. Adequate in-house staff is employed to maintain hygiene, cleanliness, and infrastructure on the campus so as to provide a congenial learning environment. Classrooms, Staffroom, Seminar hall, Auditorium, and Laboratories, etc are cleaned and maintained regularly. Washrooms and restrooms are well maintained. Dustbins are placed at various locations on the campus. The Green Cover of the campus is well maintained by a full-time gardener. There is an adequate parking facility on the college campus. The college hires various professionals to like-technicians, masons, plumber, carpenter etc. to ensure the maintenance and upkeep of the college infrastructure. Laboratories: The college has well-equipped Laboratories which are maintained by lab technicians and supervised by the concerned HOD. Every department maintains a stock register for the available equipment and other related materials. If there is fault in any equipment, the concerned HOD makes recommendations through proper channel and services of outside experts are taken. Library: The Library is run by the librarian and other helping staff. Online books, magazines, digitalization computer facilities are available in the library. The library committee is constituted for the proper maintenance and functioning of the library. The requirement and list of books is taken from different departments and HODs. The finalized list of required books is purchased after the approval of the Principal. To ensure timely return of books, 'No Dues Slip' is mandatory for students before appearing in the examination. The proper account of visitors (students and staff) on a daily basis is maintained. Other issues such as weeding out of old titles, schedule of issue/ return of books, etc are chalked out / resolved by the library committee. Sports: The college games and sports activities are run by the Physical Education Deptt. of the college. This department also bears the responsibility for the maintenance and expansion of existing sports facilities. A full-time Ground man is appointed for the maintenance of ground and Sports equipment. The college has a Basketball Court with floodlights, 400 mtrs. grassy standard track, Cricket ground with concrete practice pitch, Volleyball Court, Kabbadi Court, and Badminton indoor court. The College provides basic established sports facilities to surrounding sportsmen in the evening session. Computers: College has a centralized computer laboratory with a sufficient number of computers. A full-time technician who is an expert in computer software and hardware is appointed to maintain the computers and other equipment of the lab. Inclusiveness of all the sections of society has been the top priority of our institution as far as the admission policy is concerned. The Admission Committee takes care of the admission process of the students. The admission process commences after the declaration of the results of various boards like CBSE and BSEH. The prospective students are provided the facility of online application submission. Counseling for students is conducted before the submission of forms by the Admission Committee.
Human Resource Management	The College firmly believes that it is the pivotal role of teachers as mentors and enthusiastic and constructive support of the administrative staff which may lead an institution to accomplish its coveted aim and vision of becoming one of the best academic institutes of the region. To the fruition of this objective, the college has established a harmonious and co-operative work culture over the years. The recruitment of the teaching and non-teaching staff is done according to the guidelines of the Government of Haryana and KUK. The salary of the employees is released directly to their bank accounts as per the 7th pay commission. A shortfall of teaching and non-teaching staff is compensated by appointing contractual staff during the year. Faculty members update their knowledge and skills by actively participating in various Seminars,

Conferences, Orientation, Refresher, and short-term programs. At the end of every academic year, teachers are required to give his/her self-evaluation report in the form of an Annual Confidential Report for academic, co-curricular, and extra-curricular work done during that year. It also requires the teacher to enumerate the papers presented at conferences, seminars, refresher courses, and orientation programs he/she has attended. It is also evaluated and analyzed whether the teachers performed their duties well and completed their syllabus as per the lecture plan submitted at the beginning of the academic session.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

The College has one smart classroom and fully furnished computer laboratory which helps teachers to impart education using various ICT tools. The institute has a well-developed infrastructure comprising various labs like Physics, Chemistry, Zoology, Botany and Home Science, etc. It has a large auditorium with a capacity of almost 500 audiences, One Seminar Hall, Meeting Room, spacious classrooms, and a fully furnished administrative block.

Research and Development

The College has a conducive and congenial environment to encourage the teaching staff for different research activities like the publication of Research Papers in various national and international journals presentation of Research Papers in national and international conferences/seminars and development of e-content by teachers. Besides this, the college also organises seminars/conferences/workshops on the college campus. a helps

Examination and Evaluation

All the rules and regulation pertaining to the examinations, laid down by the university, are scrupulously followed. The internal examinations are properly conducted to make an accurate assessment of students' cognitive abilities and conceptual clarity in different academic streams. A thorough evaluation of students is done by employing different methods like- Internal Assessment Test, Assignments and Seminars. Assignments are given to the students and thoroughly discussed in the class after evaluation. The



Internal assessment marks are decided on the basis of the aggregate marks of one assessment test, two assignments and students' attendance percentage. One paper comprises theory examination of 80 percent and internal assessment of 20 percent of total marks.

**Teaching and Learning**

The Head of the Department conducts meetings with all the faculty members and allots them subjects of their interest and specialisation. A well worked out lesson plan formatted by the faculty members provides sufficient support to the students and teachers and makes the experience of teaching smooth and easy. Besides the usual teaching material, the faculty members gather data and information from other sources to enhance their teaching practice. Extension lectures by learned experts are organised by various departments in addition to the classroom teaching. Various activities like Quiz contest, students' seminars and classroom presentations are organised during the year. These activities are mentioned and highlighted in this report under metric no. 13 of part A.

**Curriculum Development**

Being affiliated with Kurukshetra University Kurukshetra, Indira Gandhi National College follows the course curriculum designed by Kurukshetra University Kurukshetra for various streams. The college follows the academic calendar of Kurukshetra University. The members of the Board of Studies of Kurukshetra University from I.G.N. College, Ladwa suggest for improvement in the Syllabi. All departments focus on successful implementation of curriculum set by the university in the college. ## 7.2 – Best Practices

7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

I Title of the Practice: Women Empowerment Objectives of the Practice: The constructive growth and sustainable development of any society require impartial and equal participation of both male and female genders in sharing the household duties as well as responsibilities of professional life. Keeping in view the gender bias and discrimination prevalent in our society in availing various opportunities like—the attainment of education, health facilities, freedom of decision making and participation in social and political spheres of life, our college organises a number of programmes to empower the girl students of the college. Through these programmes, the college enlightens the girls about their specific rights and makes them aware of their equitable status in the family, society, political, economic, and cultural spheres. The objective is to enable them to face various challenges related to gender disparity at regional, national, and international levels. Context Practice: Keeping in view the lack of awareness among the females regarding the issues of health and hygiene the Women Cell and NSS unit of the college jointly organized a community visit to village Dhanora on 1st September, 2018 to aware the female villagers, specifically the deprived section of society, regarding the serious health hazards involved in the use of cloth instead of sanitary napkins and the value of maintaining hygiene for a healthy life. 21 girl students and 2 female staff members of the college had a personal discourse with the female residents of the village and satisfied their queries. Concerning the issue of the safety of the girl students of the college and investing them with a sense of courage for self defence, the women cell of the college organised a Durga Shakti App. awareness program on 8th September, 2018. The police Deptt. Personnel of Haryana Government informed around 300 girl students of the college about the relevance of this mobile App. to seek instant police help at the moment of immediate crises. The objective of the program was to equip the females with an immediate facility of self defence on their mobile phones and help other female members of society by disseminating the knowledge of this App. After a thorough survey of the girl students of the college by the women cell it was found that a considerable number of girls do not possess the android phones and therefore, cannot avail the facility of Durga Shakti App. for self defence. To resolve the safety issues of these girls the women cell of the college organised a one day self defence physical training programme on 23rd October, 2018 in the college campus, in which about 150 students learned the tactics of self defence. During this programme, a qualified instructor trained the girl students about the use of various physical tactics to defend themselves in different situations of crisis like—cases of physical assault, eve-teasing and looting etc. Gender disparity has its roots in patriarchal social setup and the corresponding belief in the superiority of the male gender over the female which results in dumb acceptability of violence against women. Hence, to ensure the safety and security of female staff members and girl students at the workplace and



pertaining to the Constitutional doctrine of equality and personal liberty, I.G.N. College has constituted the various cells like- Anti-Sexual Harassment Cell, Legal Literacy and Women Cells etc. In order to give a congenial and constructive atmosphere to its employees and students conducive to their holistic development, the college prefers to create an environment based on the principles of equality and impartial justice which is devoid of any gender bias and discrimination. To create legal awareness among the girl students and sensitize the male students of the college to women's issues like preserving the dignity of female gender, the Anti-Sexual Harassment Cell, Legal Literacy Cell and Women Cell jointly organized an extension lecture for the students of the college on 25th October, 2018. Mrs. Savita Rana, District Women Protection officer, Kurukshetra, discussed the legal aspects and remedies regarding Sexual Harassment and domestic violence. More than 125 students attended this programme. Many students raised their queries and the resource person satisfied them amply. Evidence of Success: The women cell of the college discussed the relevance and advantages of the abovementioned programmes with the girl students and found that the execution of such awareness programmes invested the girl students with a sense of self confidence and moral courage to face the challenges of life. It was observed that acquainting them with the knowledge of their legal rights and duties helped them enhance their morale and instilled in them a strong sense of self esteem. The knowledge of the modern technological mobile applications for women security gave the girls, particularly commuting from rural areas, a strong sense of security. The utility of the Durga Shakti App, meant for providing instant help to women at a moment of crisis, was acknowledged by most of the girls using android phones. The girl students who belong to deprived sections of society and do not have android phones also benefited themselves by the physical training for self defence given to them by qualified trainers. It was also observed by the female staff members that a considerable number of girls felt inspired by the information about health and hygiene received through these programmes and enthusiastically adopted the requisite health measures suggested by the qualified professionals. Problems Encountered and Resources Required: During the process of executing these amendment programmes the women cell also faced certain problems. As most of the girl students belonging to rural backgrounds and not accustomed to using modern technological facilities in their daily life, hence, creating their aptitude for the same was a real challenge. Another issue was to ensure the girl students about the successful execution of their rights, despite all their legal awareness, in a social setup still governed by the orthodox conventions of patriarchal psyche. Some of the girl students revealed that in their social setup the right to take decisions, to use freedom of thought and to exercise one's free will is still not granted to women. Another problem encountered by the women cell was the dearth of financial resources required to successfully execute the different amendment programmes related to female empowerment. Despite the enthusiastic involvement and absolute commitment of the college women cell while executing various tasks, the cell often faces the problem of scarcity of funds required for the successful completion of these programmes. The women cell of the college is always at the disposal of the institute to play a constructive role in the development of the college provided it receives the requisite help required to accomplish its objective. II Title of the Practice: Value inculcation and Environmental Protection Initiatives Objectives of the Practice: Our College takes various initiatives to create awareness among students regarding their responsibilities towards society and environmental protection. The objective is to make the students realise their significant role in the formation of a strong and healthy society and nation. To develop the students as caring and committed individuals contributing to the holistic growth of their society, it is very important to acquaint them with an acute awareness and understanding of the communities and surrounding environment they reside in. The knowledge of their environment and delimiting

socio-economic conditions of society leads the students to a strong sense of belongingness with their surrounding atmosphere as well as fellow members and enables them to give the required assistance to their community. The Context and Practice: As it has been observed that the advent of technology in education, considered as one of the requisite skills in the modern scenario, has also posed some challenges to the educationists. Although skill development is an essential requirement to ensure the job placement of students, skills are of less value in the absence of appropriate value systems. While the advantages of using modern tools and technological innovations in modern life are well recognized, the corresponding need to balance the Intelligence quotient and emotion quotient of man has also become imperative. It is sometimes observed that an excessive dependence on technology which should be harnessed to improve the involvement and efficacy of students in the classroom leads to various distractions from mobile phones and laptops resulting in a lack of personal interaction between the teacher and students. Hence, seeing the things in the right perspective, I.G.N. College gives special consideration to the worth of inculcating ethical values among students by engaging them in various social activities: 1. Swachhta Pakhwada Abhiyan was conducted in the college premises from 1st to 15th August 2018 to make the college clean and plastic-free. 2. A door to door sanitation campaign was conducted at Village-Dhanora on 01st September 2018 to create awareness of hygiene among female villagers. 3. A cleanliness drive for cleaning the statues of famous personalities was organized on 20th September 2018, in which the college students cleaned the statues of Philanthropists like Dr. B.R. Ambedkar at Indri Chowk, Sh. O.P. Jindal at Jindal Park and statues of Shaheed Bhagat Singh, Maharaja Aggarsen at various places in Ladwa.
