This allows students to sustain the continuity of their education while adapting to evolving needs. Our faculty members have actively participated in training and faculty development programs aligned with NEP-2020, equipping themselves to provide high-quality education. The college has fostered an environment conducive to the promotion of multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary learning by introducing new courses that cater to both local and global needs. The college is also focused on nurturing entrepreneurship and self-reliance (Swavlamban) among students, in alignment with the vision of an Atmanirbhar Bharat. Through various programs designed under NEP-2020, we aim to empower students to develop skills that will help them thrive in the future.

#### **16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):**

The Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) is a digital repository that stores information about the credits earned by students throughout their academic journey. Our college is well-versed in the concept of ABC and has actively disseminated this knowledge to both faculty members and students through orientation sessions and informational talks. As an affiliated institution, our college adheres to the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) mechanism, as prescribed by the examination system of Kurukshetra University, Kurukshetra. With the adoption of the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 by the university in the current academic session, our students are now registered with the ABC to benefit from the flexibility of multiple entries and exits in their chosen programs. The ABC system offers students the valuable opportunity to transfer their earned credits, facilitating the pursuit of further education both within the country and internationally. This initiative is designed to enhance mobility and ensure that students have greater flexibility in their educational and career pathways.

#### **17.Skill development:**

Holistic development is at the heart of the college's mission, focusing on enhancing soft skills, ICT skills, language and communication abilities, and life skills among students. In alignment with NEP 2020, Skill Enhancement Courses (SECs) are offered across all programs, which are a mandatory component of the curriculum as approved by Kurukshetra University. Students have the flexibility to choose from a range of SECs available within the curriculum, allowing them to select courses that best

align with their individual needs and aspirations, further fostering their personal and professional growth.

#### **18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)**

The college offers a range of courses in Indian languages such as Hindi, Punjabi, and Sanskrit, as well as various degree programs that help students stay connected to India's rich cultural heritage and knowledge systems. A key objective of NEP-2020 is to promote the Indian Knowledge System, and our college is dedicated to this cause. To familiarize students with the teachings and values of influential Indian figures, the college celebrates the Jayanti (birth anniversaries) of great warriors, thinkers, social reformers, and national heroes. In addition, the college offers courses in three Indian languages to meet the linguistic needs of the local student population. Indian ethics and values are further instilled in students through cultural programs, competitions, and orientation sessions conducted by various cells and departments. The college library boasts a rich collection of Vedic texts, Granths, and other literature that reinforce Indian ethics and values. Moreover, the college conducts value-added course titled Human Values, where faculty members teach students the importance of human values and Indian ethics. ## 1.1 - Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Our college, affiliated with Kurukshetra University, Kurukshetra, adheres strictly to the curriculum set by the university, including the provisions of NEP 2020. To ensure effective curriculum delivery, the institution has developed a structured and efficient approach to its implementation. At the beginning of each academic session, comprehensive plans are made for the smooth delivery of the curriculum. An institutional academic calendar is prepared in alignment with the university's official academic calendar.

To develop this calendar, meetings are held by various departments and cells to discuss and plan the activities for the upcoming session. After the workload is allocated by the Heads of Departments (HODs), lesson plans, Program Outcomes (POs), Course Outcomes (COs), and Program Specific Outcomes (PSOs) are shared with students. Additionally, an orientation program is organized for freshers to familiarize them with the various cells and committees, encouraging active participation.

Each faculty member is assigned the role of mentor to guide and support their mentees, helping to address any issues or concerns. Departments and cells also organize a variety of student-centric activities, such as extension lectures, quizzes, presentations, group discussions, class tests, seminars, and workshops, to enhance learning. These activities, including access to e-resources, PowerPoint presentations, slogan-writing competitions, and more, are conducted in a blended mode to ensure an effective teaching-learning experience.

Furthermore, e-content such as YouTube videos, PowerPoint presentations, and handwritten or typed notes are shared with students to reinforce their learning.

### 1.1.2 - The institution adheres to the academic calendar including for the conduct of Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE)

Our institution follows the Semester System as per directions of the affiliated University. Following the guidelines issued by the IQAC, teachers sorted the students as advanced learners and slow learners on the basis of their marks in the previous class and their performance in the class and special efforts are made by teachers for improving their performance. Class tests, Assignments, Quizzes, Presentations etc. were conducted. For Internal Assessment as per guidelines issued by the University, 30 percent for 1st year students under NEP 2020 and 20 percent for non-NEP (2nd and 3rd year students). To ensure complete transparency, students were assigned class tests and assignments. After proper evaluation, the assignments were thoroughly discussed with the students and teachers encouraged the students to rectify their mistakes. The college strictly adhered to the time schedule laid down by the academic calendar issued by the university. Teachers and students were encouraged to have an interactive teaching-learning environment wherein the students' grievances with reference to evaluation were redressed internally and amicably. The examination committee endeavored to ensure transparency in all the activities conducted at different levels and resolved the discrepancies.

## 2.5 - Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 - Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode. Write description within 200 words.

The institution ensures that the mechanism for internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and variety. The mechanism adopted for I.A. is constant. An examination committee is constituted to coordinate the internal and external examination activities; to communicate with the students, staff regarding examinations. For effective understanding of the evaluation process, the faculty members give course-wise instructions about unique features of internal/external evaluation of that course. The syllabus for the internal examinations is communicated to students during class interaction. After every class test, answer scripts are returned to the students. The mistakes made by them are explained in detail by the concerned teacher, and guidance is given regarding the way and means of improving future performances. Changes in schedules, patterns, methods are immediately notified to the students through notice boards and classroom announcements. For each course, the respective teachers follow the pattern & guidelines issued by KUK. Class test and two home assignments in each subject are assigned to the students every semester. The college takes an I.A. of 20 percent marks in every subject. The criterion for internal assessment is given below: Two handwritten Assignments: 50% One Class Test : 25% Attendance : 25%

2.5.2 - Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time- bound and efficient

The college has a transparent, time-bound, and efficient mechanism to address examination-related grievances, covering both internal evaluations and external exams conducted by the affiliating University.

For internal exams, the Examination Committee and Heads of Departments primarily handle grievances, with the Head of the Institution stepping in for more complex issues. Faculty members maintain a strong rapport with students, ensuring they feel comfortable approaching teachers regarding any concerns. Internal

assessment results are shared with students, who can raise grievances with the respective subject teacher or the Head of the Institution. The Examination Branch promptly takes remedial measures to resolve these issues.

As final exams are conducted by Kurukshetra University, the marks are awarded by university-appointed examiners. The University's Examination Branch oversees the process, including the publication of results. If students are dissatisfied with their marks, they can apply for revaluation within 15 days of receiving their result. The college supports students in this process, offering guidance on submitting the necessary documents for revaluation. Students can also file an RTI application regarding the fee, following university-prescribed procedures. This system ensures a fair and efficient resolution of examination-related grievances.

The Kurukshetra University Kurukshetra, affiliating university, offers objective-based curriculum which incorporate a broad spectrum of knowledge, skills, abilities and attitudes that students attain during the pursuit of graduate courses. The institution offers Humanities, Commerce and Science program with well-defined outcomes. The course outcomes of each course are framed by the respective faculty members of the institution. The attainment level of framed course outcomes is measured by respective teachers on the basis of internal assessment (20 marks) and external examination (80 marks) conducted by the university. The attainment level for course outcomes is set by the teacher on the basis of the type of the course and the quality of the students admitted. After the declaration of the semester result, the faculty members analysed and discussed the result of each course and give their suggestions for further improvement in their departmental meeting. Since 2012, our college library has employed a computerized automation system using the open-source library management software "Koha" version 22.05.05.000. The library subscribes to several high-quality journals and periodicals. With a collection of

approximately 20180 books, 25 periodicals, 6,000 e-journals, 195,600 eBooks, and other digital resources, our library is well-equipped to meet the diverse needs of its users. In addition to course books, the library regularly adds general books for personality development, general knowledge, handbooks, yearbooks, and a rare collection of great reference books. The library is tastefully furnished and can accommodate up to a hundred students at a time in its spacious reading halls, fitted with Study Carrels.

Our college is a privately managed government aided college and the main sources of finance are the grants from DGHE Panchkula, UGC grants, scholarships from State government and philanthropists as well as fees collected from students (SFS). All the financial affairs are duly supervised by the college Bursar and Purchase committee to ensure adherence to rules and procedures. There is a systematic mechanism for both internal and external audits. For internal audit, there is a proper procedure to make purchases and incur different types of expenditure. Requirements from different corners are received in written form and those are discussed with and approved by the Principal. Conveners of the Purchase Committee and Bursar verify the items purchased and procedures followed and then bills are paid after the signature of the Principal. An Accountant of the college maintains all the records of financial transactions in accounting software Tally. All the vouchers and bills are then checked by the Chartered Accountant of the college

(appointed by the governing body) as per government rules. For external audit, the auditors come from DGHE, Panchkula, Audit Cell of Kurukshetra University, Kurukshetra and Accountant General Haryana, Chandigarh as per their schedule from time to time.

Our college, affiliated with Kurukshetra University, Kurukshetra, adheres strictly to the curriculum set by the university, including the provisions of NEP 2020. To ensure effective curriculum delivery, the institution has developed a structured and efficient approach to its implementation. At the beginning of each academic session, comprehensive plans are made for the smooth delivery of the curriculum. ### 1.1.2 - The institution adheres to the academic calendar including for the conduct of Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE)

Our institution follows the Semester System as per directions of the affiliated University. Following the guidelines issued by the IQAC, teachers sorted the students as advanced learners and slow learners on the basis of their marks in the previous class and their performance in the class and special efforts are made by teachers for improving their performance. Class tests, Assignments, Quizzes, Presentations etc. were conducted. For Internal Assessment as per guidelines issued by the University, 30 percent for 1st year students under NEP2020 and 20 percent for non-NEP (2nd and 3rd year students). To ensure complete transparency, students were assigned class tests and assignments. After proper evaluation, the assignments were thoroughly discussed with the students and teachers encouraged the students to rectify their mistakes. The college strictly adhered to the time schedule laid down by the academic calendar issued by the university. Teachers and students were encouraged to have an interactive teaching-learning environment wherein the students' grievances with reference to evaluation were redressed internally and amicably. The examination committee endeavored to ensure transparency in all the activities conducted at different levels and resolved the discrepancies.

2. The college's Wi-Fi-enabled campus ensures seamless internet connectivity across all facilities. ICT-enabled laboratories, including Chemistry, Physics, and Computer labs, are equipped with internet/Wi-Fi, desktops, projectors, and printers.
3. Additionally, a Commerce department room is equipped with a projector.
4. The college has two seminar halls: one features Wi-Fi, a projector, a laptop, and an interactive board, while the other is equipped with Wi-Fi, a projector, and a laptop.

#### 2.5 - Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 - Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode. Write description within 200 words.

The institution ensures that the mechanism for internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and variety. The mechanism adopted for I.A. is constant. An examination committee is constituted to coordinate the internal and external examination activities; to communicate with the students, staff regarding examinations. For effective understanding of the evaluation process, the faculty members give course-wise instructions about unique features of internal/external evaluation of that course. The syllabus for the internal examinations is communicated to students during class interaction. After every class test, answer scripts are returned to the students. The mistakes made by them are explained in detail by the concerned teacher, and guidance is given regarding the way and means of improving future performances. Changes in schedules, patterns, methods are immediately notified to the students through notice boards and classroom announcements. For each course, the respective teachers follow the pattern & guidelines issued by KUK. Class test and two home assignments in each subject are assigned to the students every semester. The college takes an I.A. of 20 percent marks in every subject. The criterion for internal assessment is given below: Two handwritten Assignments: 50% One Class Test : 25% Attendance : 25%

2.5.2 - Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

The college has a transparent, time-bound, and efficient mechanism to address examination-related grievances, covering both internal evaluations and external exams conducted by the affiliating University.

For internal exams, the Examination Committee and Heads of Departments primarily handle grievances, with the Head of the Institution stepping in for more complex issues. Faculty members maintain a strong rapport with students, ensuring they feel comfortable approaching teachers regarding any concerns. Internal assessment results are shared with students, who can raise grievances with the respective subject teacher or the Head of the Institution. The Examination Branch promptly takes

remedial measures to resolve these issues.

As final exams are conducted by Kurukshetra University, the marks are awarded by university-appointed examiners. The University's Examination Branch oversees the process, including the publication of results. If students are dissatisfied with their marks, they can apply for revaluation within 15 days of receiving their result. The college supports students in this process, offering guidance on submitting the necessary documents for revaluation. Students can also file an RTI application regarding the fee, following university-prescribed procedures. This system ensures a fair and efficient resolution of examination-related grievances.

The Kurukshetra University Kurukshetra, affiliating university, offers objective-based curriculum which incorporate a broad spectrum of knowledge, skills, abilities and attitudes that students attain during the pursuit of graduate courses. The institution offers Humanities, Commerce and Science program with well-defined outcomes. The learning outcomes of courses are designed by the faculty members to ensure complete and comprehensive learning about the courses as these are critical for the successful career of the student. The course outcomes of each course are framed by the respective faculty members of the institution. The attainment level of framed course outcomes is measured by respective teachers on the basis of internal assessment (20 marks) and external examination (80 marks) conducted by the university. The attainment level for course outcomes is set by the teacher on the basis of the type of the course and the quality of the students admitted. After the declaration of the semester result, the faculty members analysed and discussed the result of each course and give their suggestions for further improvement in their departmental meeting. The mentors monitored the performance of the mentees in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities to assure that the course outcomes are acquired. The library subscribes to several high-quality journals and periodicals. With a collection of approximately 20180 books, 25 periodicals, 6,000 e-journals, 195,600 eBooks, and other digital resources, our library is well-equipped to meet the diverse needs of its users. In addition to course books, the library regularly adds general books for personality development, general knowledge, handbooks, yearbooks, and a rare collection of great reference books. The library is tastefully furnished and can accommodate up to a hundred students at a time in its spacious reading halls, fitted with Study Carrels.

#### 6.4 - Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

Our college is a privately managed government aided college and the main sources of finance are the grants from DGHE Panchkula, UGC grants, scholarships from State government and philanthropists as well as fees collected from students (SFS). All the financial affairs are duly supervised by the college Bursar and Purchase committee to ensure adherence to rules and procedures. There is a systematic mechanism for both internal and external audits. For internal audit, there is a proper procedure to make purchases and incur different types of expenditure. Requirements from different corners are received in written form and those are discussed with and approved by the Principal. Conveners of the Purchase Committee and Bursar verify the items purchased and procedures followed and then bills are paid after the signature of the Principal. An Accountant of the college maintains all the records of financial transactions in accounting software Tally. All the vouchers and bills are then checked by the Chartered Accountant of the college (appointed by the governing body) as per government rules. For external audit, the auditors come from DGHE, Panchkula, Audit Cell of Kurukshetra University, Kurukshetra and Accountant General Haryana, Chandigarh as per their schedule from time to time.
